



A Word Of Hope From The Rector-By *The Rev. Jenny Scott-Jones* Just Drift Away

*Hey, give me the beat, boys, and free my soul
I wanna get lost in your rock 'n' roll and drift away*

A few weeks ago I used my two-year-old daughter learning to float on her back as a sermon illustration. In part reflecting on how it can be really hard – almost counter-intuitive – to let oneself fully relax so that floating can be achieved. She just wants to kick her little legs thinking that would give her control, but with each kick she becomes less stable. That image has stuck with me. I have this desire to take a moment to just float on my back out in the warm gulf waters, a brief pause to simply drift away. But as soon as I begin to dream of that moment, my brain starts to kick with the long list of things that I should be doing.

Maybe drifting away is like an act of Sabbath-Keeping. God created sabbath on the 7th day so the final act wasn't God creating humans, but instead rest; not productivity but contentful peace. The commandment to keep the Sabbath day "holy" was given to Hebrew people after the exodus from Egyptian slavery in part so that they did not take back what they left behind in Egypt, protecting them from once more becoming slaves to commodities.

Practicing regular rhythms of rest, or sabbath-keeping, in our everyday lives ultimately helps us to remember that God is in charge and that we can trust in that as the world keeps spinning, while we ourselves hit the pause button to rest and be restored. We are not gods, nor are we simply the sum of our productions.

Regular sabbath keeping creates an alternative rhythm or beat to our days. Dobie Grey's song "Drift Away" is a song of rest. "The world outside looks so unkind / Now I'm countin' on you to carry me through." When the world around us becomes too much for us to bear, we can pause, remember that God carries this burden, not us, and we can move out of the chaotic noise of anxiety and back into a beat that brings renewal.

"And when my mind is free / You know a melody can move me / And when I'm feelin' blue / A guitar's comin' through to soothe me" When our hearts and minds are heavy with grief or despair, rest can give us a rhythm that helps to regroup and regulate our bodies, minds, and spirits.

"Day after day I'm more confused / Yet I look for the light through the pourin' rain / You know that's a game that I hate to lose / And I'm feelin' the strain, ain't it a shame?" Taking sabbath helps us to relinquish the control that we think we have over a situation but in reality becomes counterproductive and often leads to losing our ability to float. Taking rest is trusting that God holds it all. God holds us.

So even before the feelings of chaos or drama, anxiety or exhaustion set in, creating regular practices of rest and sabbath-keeping allow our minds and bodies to learn a different beat or rhythm, one that helps us to find peace and simply drift. May we each find the rhythms that invite us to float.

The Steps of Lectio Divina

Lectio Divina is an ancient Christian practice of meditative Scripture reading. It shifts the goal from studying for information to allowing God's word to transform your heart. The four simple, unhurried steps are detailed below:

1. **Lectio (Read)** Read it slowly and attentively, listening for a word or phrase that captures your attention.
2. **Meditation (Reflect)** Read the passage again. Ponder the word or phrase that stood out to you. Repeat it softly in your mind, allowing it to interact with your life, thoughts, and memories.
3. **Oratio (Respond)** Let the Scripture naturally lead you into a conversation with God. Speak to Him honestly about what you just read, whether that means offering thanks, bringing Him a struggle, or asking for grace.
4. **Contemplation (Rest)** Read the passage one final time. Sit in silent, receptive rest in God's presence, letting go of words and allowing His love to transform.

Monthly Prayer From the Book Of Common Prayer

The last set of prayers in The Book of Common Prayer's Daily Offices is a lovely brief service to say at the end of day – Compline (beginning on page 127). Like Noonday prayer, it can be said in as little as five minutes but has this lovely ability to hand over to God all that has happened in the day so that your body and mind can find peace resting in God's care. Here are two parts of the prayers that I find particularly helpful to create an inward posture of rest.

The first is typically a responsory prayer but can also be said by one individual.

V. *Into your hands, O Lord, I commend my spirit;*
R. *For you have redeemed me, O Lord, O God of truth.*
V. *Keep us, O Lord, as the apple of your eye;*
R. *Hide us under the shadow of your wings.*

The second comes from the words of Simeon who had long anticipated the day when he would witness the coming Messiah (Luke 2:25-35)

Lord, you now have set your servant free to go in peace as you have promised;
For these eyes of mine have seen the Savior, whom you have prepared for all the world to see:
A Light to enlighten the nations, and the glory of your people Israel. Glory to the Father, and to the Son, and to the Holy Spirit: as it was in the beginning, is now, and will be for ever.

Two from Iona-Hope Attend Annual Stewardship Workshop-By Paula Paquette



This year's Diocesan Stewardship Workshop was entitled "Growing Generous Disciples." It was held on August 9th at DaySpring Episcopal Conference Center with over 60 people in attendance. Mr. Robin Mills and Ms. Paula Paquette, two members of the Finance Committee, attended on behalf of Iona-Hope. The presenter was Mr. Richard Rogers of Horizons Stewardship. His message was encouraging and hopeful - even though churches sometimes find it challenging to meet their annual budgets. The event lasted from 9 a.m. to 2 p.m. with a nice luncheon and networking time in the middle. There were several impactful take-aways from the day, which are briefly outlined below. Churches are uniquely situated to be a focus of member giving because the home church remains a top priority to members. People want to give to their home church because: Biblical foundations of faith are based on the home church, People care about the local church if we are giving them a foundation for their faith journey, Momentous life events are experienced at church, and People visit their church and benefit from it weekly. As for the biblical basis for generosity to the church, throughout the New Testament we are urged to participate in the local church, to express our generosity first through the local church and then in whatever other expressions we choose.

Overall, people give to their church for the following reasons:

Belief in the mission, Confidence in its leadership, and Fiscal responsibility of the organization. More specifically: a clearly communicated, inspiring mission fuels generosity, respected leadership leads to investment in the organization, and healthy, vibrant organizations attract sustained generosity. "When we live generously, we more reflect the nature and character of God." Mr. Rogers, the presenter, suggested that every church should have a year-round Generosity Committee or group. The role of this committee would be to think about the church's Generosity to its community, to recognize and encourage Generosity, and to celebrate the church's impact at every turn. This group, he said, is separate from the Vestry, separate from Finance, and separate even from Stewardship. The Generosity Committee does not ask for money, or things, or help. Instead, the Generosity Committee would create its own expression for our beloved church, Iona-Hope. The stewardship workshop was very meaningful and hopeful and everyone left with a sense of how important the many expressions of local church are as part of the kingdom creation.

Helpful Updates



Vestry Voice-By *Debbie Prather*

The Vestry met on Tuesday, August 18, 2026.

We heard a report from members of the Finance Team, Robin Mills and Paula Pacquette, who attended the Diocesan Stewardship Workshop. They reported on some of what they learned at the workshop, including: Charitable giving to churches has dropped sharply over the last few decades. In 1980, 55% of the population donated to churches, compared to just 24% in 2025. It is important that we connect giving to discipleship- fund a mission. We were asked to discern a new mission statement that is clearly communicated, inspiring and feeds generosity. We must stress contemporary ways of giving, such as online gifts and direct deposit from bank accounts. We were also asked to appoint a Generosity Committee that would bring to the attention of the congregation all sorts of acts of generosity.

The Finance Team will serve as the Estimate of Giving committee for the year 2026/2027. They are considering the theme “One Church, One Body, One Mission.” Vestry was asked to appoint such a committee for 2027/2028 now. A motion was passed to disburse dedicated funds quarterly. Funds from Bingo go to the general operating account for this budget year. Next year the Bingo group can decide to give their funds to a charity.

An Update From Your Finance Committee

In July, Iona-Hope Episcopal Church and the One More Time Thrift Store were able to share \$70,000 in grants to community groups. Generosity is a hallmark of our congregation as we strive to live the words of Matthew 25:35-36: “For I was hungry and you gave me something to eat, I was thirsty and you gave me something to drink, I was a stranger and you invited me in, I needed clothes and you clothed me, I was sick and you looked after me, I was in prison and you came to visit me.” Like the miracle of the loaves and fishes, what little we offer goes much further when shared among others. By our support of food pantries, service agencies and the wider community, other hands multiply our donations to the benefit of those in need.

Convocation

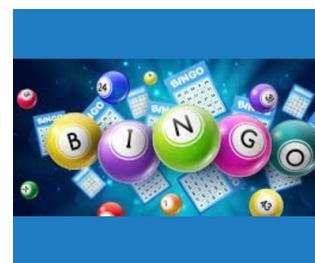

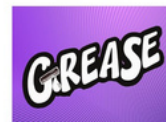
